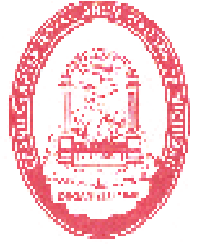

**A Conversation with
G. Gordon Goodman
PGHP. PMIGM**

Last December, while in Florida, making an early escape from Michigan's winter weather for a few weeks, my wife Kristi and I had the pleasure of stopping in Palm Harbor for a visit with our senior Past Grand High Priest, G. Gordon Goodman and Lady Tina. At the time I made arrangements for our visit, my plan was to conduct a "question and answer" type of interview. While I did manage to ask about 4 questions, many times MEC Goodman tended to go far beyond any questions I ever would have thought of asking. This resulted in my changing the interview to a conversation, which I found much more interesting than what would have been simple answers to my feeble questions.

By way of background for anyone not familiar with MEC G. Gordon Goodman, he was born in Fraddon, Cornwall, England on Sept. 24, 1920. He was raised a Master Mason in Acacia Lodge #477 of Grosse Pointe Woods MI. on Feb. 21, 1956 and served as Worshipful Master in 1967. Last year his Blue Lodge membership was transferred to Stoney Creek Lodge #5 of Rochester. He was exalted as a Royal Arch Mason in Acacia Chapter #168 of Warren MI. on Dec. 13, 1956 and served as Excellent High Priest in 1961. He is now a member of Shores Chapter # 69 in St. Clair Shores. Gordon was greeted as a Super Excellent Master in Monroe Council # 1 of Monroe MI. on April 15, 1961 and served as TIM in 1977. He received the Order of the Temple in Highland Park Commandery #53 of Highland Park, MI. on March 24, 1960 and served as Eminent Commander in 1969. At the present time he is a member of Mt.

Clemens # 51. Gordon is a member of Prince Edwin York Rite College #8, is a holder of the Order of the Purple Cross of York, is a past Grand Governor for Michigan and in 1976 was Herald General of the York Rite Sovereign College of North America. He joined the Valley of Detroit, AASR in May of 1973. In addition he holds the DeMolay Legion of Honor award.

Gordon was Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Michigan in 1971 and MIGM of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masons of Michigan in 1982. According to an article in the Dec.08-Jan.09 issue of the Clearwater (FL.) York Rite Newsletter he has the distinction of being the only Senior Presiding Officer of both the Grand Chapter and Grand Council at the same time.

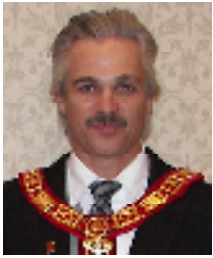
Question: Gordon, you were born in 1920, which means you grew up during the Great Depression, could you tell me a little about your childhood and if you and your family were affected by the depression?

Gordon: I was born in the village of Fraddon which is in Cornwall, at the Southwestern corner of England. I had a good childhood, we weren't rich but we never had to worry about food on the table or a roof over our heads. Now, my father was the head of a clay works¹ and he also had a small plot of land with a few cows, chickens, and pigs, so we were relatively unaffected by the depression. When I was a boy, my mother passed away and my sister, Vera and I were sent to live with my grandparents. My grandfather, he was a Methodist minister. After a few years, my father remarried and we went back to live with him and our step-mother. At the age of 17, I was certain that we would be going to war with Germany and I convinced my father to allow me to enlist in the military.

Question: Can you relate some of your wartime experiences?

Gordon: I enlisted in the RAF when I was 18. They started out to train me as a rear gunner in a bomber, but after a short time they decided my talents were better used at the other end of the aircraft and made me into a pilot. I soon found myself, at just 19 years old, based at an airfield in Iceland and flying a bomber looking for the dreadnaught² Bismarck.

Goodman – Continued. Those bombers that we flew in the beginning of the war were slow, they couldn't fly very high, only about 8,000-10,000 ft., and the bombsights weren't very accurate. We were easy targets for the German fighters and anti-aircraft guns, but the Germans were in the same situation with their bombers. Those were the reasons we both went to nighttime bombing missions. After the Americans got into the war at the end of '41 and into '42 and they brought their B-17s and B-24s, they could fly at 25,000-30,000 ft., with their much better bombsight, so they could do precision daylight bombing missions. In '42 the English also started using the new Lancaster bomber which was a huge improvement over the Manchesters and others that we used until then.

In late '40 I was wounded and went to Canada for some time away from combat to recover. While I was stationed at Mt. Hope in Hamilton, Ontario, I went to Detroit to visit a great aunt who lived there. My aunt knew of a family in Detroit, the father was from the same part of England as I was, and it just happened that they had two daughters about my age. My aunt asked if I would like to meet the girls. Of course, being 20 years old, I said I would love to meet them. One of the girls, Doris, had a new Nash car that we could drive around in. For the next year, every time I could get a 72 hour pass from the facility where I was stationed, I went to Detroit to meet her and we were married in 1942. Our oldest son was born '43 just before I went back to the war to get ready for D-Day. I was wounded again in '44 and while I was in the hospital in pretty bad shape, the British government had Doris and our baby brought over from the States. The first time I saw them in the hospital, I thought I must have died, but after awhile I realized it hadn't happened yet. After I recovered and the war ended in 1945, I retired from the RAF.

In 1946, my family, consisting of my wife, our son, our newborn baby girl, and I came to the U.S. Speaking of our oldest daughter, who was born in England, Doris said "That's the only thing that wasn't rationed in England!" My wife had an uncle in the travel business and he had connections with Cunard White Star Lines so we managed to sail across the Atlantic on the RMS Queen Elizabeth. We landed in New York on Thanksgiving Day 1946. We settled in the Detroit area, near her family.

I enrolled in Wayne University (now Wayne State University) and after finishing my studies, I made a career in the legal profession. Because of my career and the area where we lived, we met and were friends with many of the leaders in both business and politics in Michigan. I retired in 1984 and Doris and I moved to Florida soon after.

Doris passed away in 1999 after 57 years of marriage. I remarried later and my second wife, Virginia, passed on about 6 years ago. Tina and I were married shortly before the Grand Session in August of 2007, and she helps keep me young.

I have stayed active in Masonic bodies down here in Florida. Lodge, Chapter, Council, Commandery, all of them. I was Commander of Springtime Commandery #40 in 1993.

This Return provides information in several areas:

1. Officers of your Chapter
2. Recapitulation
3. Financial

This Return is the foundation of your history with the Grand Chapter, and answers questions such as who were the Officers of your Chapter in any given year. How many members did you have? How many were gained? How many were lost? Status of Life Members, Honorary Members, etc... And for what reasons? As well as your financial condition, which must be submitted to the Federal Government.

The compilation of all Chapter Returns reflect the condition of the Royal Craft throughout the State.

Your per capita provides much of the funds necessary to operate the Grand Chapter and assist in providing various services, programs and materials for the Chapters, which must be known in order to properly prepare the Grand Chapter Budget.

The services and programs provided by your Grand Chapter must be budgeted for in the Grand Chapter Budget which can only be established within fiscal responsibility of Incomes received. Some of the provided services are:

1. Support of our Philanthropies
2. Grand Chapter Directory
3. Annual Grand Session and Proceedings
4. Education and Educational materials & brochures
5. Membership and other historical records
6. Public relations activities
7. Awards programs, such as MSA, Master Pins, Ritual, etc..

8. Grand Chapter Office and Records Storage
9. Paraphernalia
10. The Ritual
11. The Red Book
12. Membership, Officers Handbook
13. Support of our Masonic Youth
14. The DDI System
15. The Triple Tau Publication
16. The Grand Chapter WEB Site
17. Grand Secretary services, Dues Cards, Membership Lists, Certificates, Etc.
18. Financial Management and Control of the Grand Chapter Business
19. General Management of the Chapters
20. Grand Chapter Representatives System
21. Administration of Schools and Inspections
22. Grand Chapter Committees
23. And other programs to assist in the Growth & Development of the Royal Craft, Such as the "Enhance the Secret" Program, Area Degree Teams.

Accuracy, Completeness, and Prompt action of your return is extremely important.

Goodman – Continued. I have been Prelate for a number of years, and once a year I do the Commander’s part for the Order of the Temple and I do it following the Michigan ritual. It’s different from the Florida ritual and they all love it. I’m also active in Hi-Twelve, where I’m Chaplain, and served on the Board of Directors for years. The Scottish Rite has a luncheon once a month that I attend regularly.

I have also tried to be involved in civic duties here. Right now I’m a legal advisor to the Pinellas County Sheriff’s Dept. We have a regular commission that meets once a month to try to keep the department in compliance with the law regarding officer conduct and suspect rights.

Question: How did you happen to become interested in Masonry?

Gordon: My father-in law, Bill, was a Mason and he used to take me with him to dinner when his lodge would do the Master Mason Degree. After dinner they would all leave me in the dining room while everybody went up to the lodgeroom for the work. Well, I asked him once, “How come I can’t go upstairs with the rest of you?” and he just kind of brushed me off. Bill’s son, Billy owned a bar and Bill like to stop off after the work to have a beer before we went home. One night a fellow came in to the bar and greeted Bill with a hearty “Hello Brother Bill” and Bill introduced me to him as his son-in-law. The fellow asked Bill if I was a member of the lodge and Bill told him “Hell, no! He don’t know how to be a member.” I figured it out then and joined the lodge soon after.

Question: What are you most proud of for your year as Grand High Priest?

Gordon: We only lost one member in my year and I was proud that I could visit the chapters, that I had the time to get out and make visits to many of them. And I was proud of my officers, they did a great job.

Close: Well Gordon, I have almost 3 hours of material to edit to a manageable size for the Triple Tau. I think we had better wrap this up, and I thank you for your time. We’ve both really enjoyed our visit with you and Tina and we are all looking forward to seeing you at the Grand Session in Bay City in August.

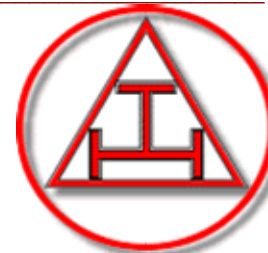
