### *To Your Health*

Companions, this article may be off topic for a forum of primary interest to Royal Arch Masons but it concerns an issue that many of us have faced in the past, are facing now, or will face in the future. I am referring to prostate cancer, which is diagnosed in 17% of all men in the U.S., and is second only to various skin cancers in terms of total men affected by cancer. It is also second to lung cancer in cancer related deaths in men, causing about 30,000 deaths each year. The total number of cases of prostate cancer is probably higher, but, because most cases of prostate cancer begin after the age of 60 and many are very slow growing, many men die of other causes before their prostate cancer is diagnosed. (My personal opinion, and one that I have heard from a few in the medical profession, is if you are born a male and if you live long enough, eventually you will develop prostate cancer. It's just a question of whether or not something else gets you before the cancer does.)

The most reliable methods of diagnosing prostate cancer are the Prostate Specific Antigen blood test and the Digital Rectal Exam. The PSA test determines the level of antigens in the blood that are created exclusively to combat prostate cancer. Typically a low number, 3 or below, is considered good for a younger man with the number going up gradually as he ages. A number that shows a large change, e.g. 3.5 going up to 5 or 6 or even higher within a year, is an indicator that something may be wrong and more testing may be called for. The DRE is just that, a physician checks for abnormalities by feeling the prostate through the wall of the colon.

There has been some debate in medical commun-

ity regarding the PSA test in recent years because it may give a false positive result requiring further testing and/or anxiety in the patient when nothing is wrong, or it may give a false negative allowing for a sense of security when further testing or even treatment may be advisable. In spite of the possibility of errors, PSA screening is still one of the best tools for early diagnosis. Many doctors still recommend an annual PSA test for men over 50 and beginning between 40 and 45 if there is a history of prostate cancer among the men in their family. Besides age and family history, other indicators of risk include race (African-American men are at the high end of the risk pool, Native-Americans and Asians at the low end), diet (high fat content), and exposure to certain chemicals (even the VA now agrees that Agent Orange may be a culprit in the case of Viet-Vets).

If diagnosed early enough, there may be several treatment options available for the man who has developed prostate cancer. These range from "Watchful Waiting", basically doing nothing if it appears to be a slow growing cancer and the patient is of advanced years, to surgery if the cancer is found in a large part of the prostate. In between are hormone treatment, radiation with implanted seeds, conventional radiation and/or chemotherapy, and cryogenic treatment where extremely cold liquids are injected into the prostate to "freeze" the cancer cells. Surgery, called a radical prostatectomy or RP for short, is probably the most effective treatment if the cancer is contained within the prostate. With DaVinci, or robotic surgery, surgical risks are minimized and recovery time is short. Side effects may include incontinence (both short term and long term) and E/D. Hormone treatment is the use of hormones such as estrogen to combat the growth of the cancer, which is influenced by testosterone. It is frequently used after RP to combat any cancer cells that may have been left behind. Side effects include hot flashes, breast enlargement, weight increase, E/D, mood swings, memory loss, and more.

Radioactive seed implants, called brachytherapy, works if the cancer is discovered early and is confined to a small area of the prostate. Side effects may be an extreme urge to urinate frequently, ED, and seed migration. There is also a slight risk of infection whenever a foreign

*Continued from Page 1-* foreign substance is placed in the body. Radiation or Chemo is used primarily in conjunction with surgery when the cancer is advanced and has spread beyond the prostate to other organs nearby. Depending on dosages, side effects can include nausea, diarrhea, loss of appetite, hair loss, vomiting, and skin irritation. Cryogenics is still largely experimental and few doctors recommend it because of low success rates.

Remember, with early diagnosis and proper treatment prostate cancer is curable with minimal side effects. The more advanced it becomes, the more extreme the treatment and the greater the severity of side effects.

If all this information is “Old Hat” to you and you already know it well, I congratulate you. You have done your homework; you are probably getting tested regularly, and possibly are either undergoing treatment now or have been treated already.

I am addressing these remarks to those of you over 40-45 years old and have not yet begun a program of prostate cancer detection. If you are in this category, I encourage you to consult your medical professional as soon as possible. I suggest that if you do nothing else at this time, at least get a PSA screening to establish a baseline for what is considered normal for you. If you are over 50, and are not getting regular check-ups it is time to begin...now. It just may save your life and at the same time, help preserve your lifestyle.

The Sphinx originally had a woman's head looking up at the stars that head was cut down to its present size and shape by the Egyptians about three millennia ago. The sphinx originally was shaped as follows: Bear claws, Lions body, Woman's head, Eagles wings. The eagles wings were destroyed about the time of the great deluge.

The Great Pyramid had its outer casing stones stolen from it to build the Moscks in Egypt. Originally the polished limestone that covered the great pyramid was unbroken prior to about the entrance made by Al Mamoun and his men in 820ad. They picked a spot on north side (in the middle) and began digging. The limestone outer casing was so tight, and so clean, that they could not find the seams to discover the opening. An opening they later discovered by hearing an echo to their left. When they started digging left of their present cave they discovered the descending passage. It wasn't until after 850ad when nothing was found in the pyramid that it was decided to have been worthless and the limestone covering was taken from it. ### **Statge II: Identification of the ;membership principles that will contribute to our fraternity in a meaningful way**

- **Principle 1 – The priority of our fraternity should be to raise active Mason's:** The longer any organization exists (ours is the oldest and largest fraternity in the world), the more concerned it tends to become with self-preservation – and the less concerned with its original purpose. In my opinion, as I have pointed out in my previous articles our focus needs to be on masonic philosophy, ritual and the fire points of fellowship rather than mere numerical growth. The focus on just numbers without these factors have resulted in, not surprising, masonic organizations that have stopped growing. Thus my foremost principle would be (to suggest) that we should consider all the charges in every single degree, live by those principles, and raise only those willing to embrace the philosophy.

- **Principle 2 – Social networks are the vehicle:** In my opinion, this is the silver bullet that we have seemingly forgotten (Except for Companion T. Baker): Non-Masons discover our fraternity primarily through relationships with Masons. This may seem elementary but I continue to be amazed by components of our organization that believe something other than Masons (through correct practice of masonic philosophy/principles) reaching non-masonic friends will somehow promote growth. **In my poinion, active Masons bring over twice as many candidates into our brotherhood than all the other efforts combined!**

- **Principle 3 – Basic needs are the connecting points:** Unfortunately, most men are not walking down the street considering philosophical questions or how they impact their existence and being in the world. But they are thinking of thins

### Water & Heart Attacks –

Drinking water at a certain time maximizes its effectiveness on the body:

- 2 glasses of water after waking up – helps activate internal organs
- 1 glass of water 30 minutes before a meal – helps digestion
- 1 glass of water before taking a bath – helps lower blood pressure
- 1 glass of water before going to bed – avoids stroke or heart attack

Water at bed time will also help prevent night time leg cramps. Your leg muscles are seeking hydration when they cramp and wake you up.
